A fresh snowfall is lots of fun—forts, snowball fights, and snow angels! Nature heroes get excited about snow, too. A fresh dusting gives young explorers a glimpse into animal adventures happening right in your neighborhood.

Grab your winter gear, head out after a fresh snowfall, and look for animal tracks. All you need to be a wildlife tracker is:

- 1. A simple field guide (you can start by using
- 2. A ruler to measure the size of each track and the distance between sets of tracks (this helps you figure out whose track it is!)
- 3. A field journal to write down your observations
- 4. A camera to take photos of tracks you see (remember to place a ruler or small object next to the tracks in your photos so you can tell how big they really are)
- A sense of adventure—you never know where the tracks will lead you!
