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

Twenty miles of trails invite you into fields, forests, and wetlands where you can explore and connect with the natural world. Special routes and destinations abound at Moose Hill, each filled with wildlife observation opportunities and scenic views. The diversity of terrain and variety of habitats offer rich experiences in all seasons. Return often, at different times of the day and throughout the year, so that you can see signs of change and experience the seasonal cycles in New England.

About Questing

Questing was born out of a 150-year old tradition in the region surrounding Dartmoor National Park in southwest England. "Letterboxing," as this tradition is called, is a popular past time, with thousands of boxes hidden in both natural and cultural locations. Vital Communities, a regional non-profit organization based in Vermont, built on this tradition in the United States by developing the Valley Quest program. In the early 1990s, Vital Communities was concerned about the future of the Upper Valley region of New Hampshire and Vermont, and was hoping to develop a program that would foster sense of place, strengthen relationships between schools and communities, and build bridges across the generations. The result was Valley Quest, with "Valley" referring to the place and "Quest" referring to a treasure hunt—made by children and adults working together—leading to the community's special places. Over time, the Valley Quest program has grown. More than 2,000 children, adults, families, scouts, students and historical society members have contributed to the creation of the 200+Quests found in the Valley Quest books; and communities across the country are beginning to replicate Valley Quest's success.

This Quest is best done in spring, summer, or fall.

Kettle and Pine Trail Quests



Verses marked by indicate stops with a numbered sign. The sign has an orange hole-punch attached. When you reach the sign, punch the back-page of this packet. Be careful the hole-punch is sharp! When you collect all the punches, head back to the front desk for the final stamp and complete the Quest.

The Kettle Quest is about 2 miles and will take approximately 90 minutes. The Pine Forest Quest is less than a mile and will take approximately 30 minutes.

Begin your quest south of the Nature Center at the trail head across

Moose Hill Parkway.

Through the old parking lot
Into the trees- some have knots
Walk south until you come across the post
The trail sign for Ovenbird Trail will help you
the most

You've reached Sign I straight ahead attached to an oak tree.

Here you have a choice: you can stay right to complete the longer Kettle Quest or take a left onto Ovenbird Trail to complete the short Pine Forest Quest

If you chose the Pine Forest Quest, continue on the Ovenbird Trail and skip to the directions for Sign 4

If you chose the Kettle Quest, continue through the Unnatural Trail

Objects shiny and man-made Hidden along the trail and in the shade Once at the end of this Unnatural Trail Continue East onto the Kettle Trail.

A rock wall on your right You'll notice daylight Walking alongside a meadow Search for animals in camo.

Look for Sign 2 to the right of the trail attached to an evergreen tree across from a big boulder.

Past bushes of huckleberry Downhill over a fallen tree Between beech trees They don't like to lose their leaves.

Evidence of glaciers in the past Carved this landscape that is vast Deep depressions called kettle holes Look like they're between woody knolls

Up and down a glacial moraine Hopefully there is no rain Nature waves its magic wand Glacier leaves a kettle pond.

Straight ahead you see a boardwalk and to your left a sign post for Ovenbird Trail. Turn left onto Ovenbird Trail.

Walk along a babbling stream
Get lost in a day dream
The path veers away from the stream line
Headed into trees of pine.

To find Sign 3, look to the right of the trail on an oak tree. Continue on the Ovenbird Trail past the Pine Trail turn. Uphill and through a rock wall Listen for birds call Erosion exposed the tree roots Make sure you pick up your boots.

If you chose Pine Forest Quest start the directions again here

Looking all around
These trees stay green year round
A lot of needles and pine cones
Take a picture with your phone.

To find Sign 4, turn onto Pine Trail and look to your left on a pine tree.

Over fallen tree and downhill Walk until you come to a "T" in the trail Turn left onto Pine trail and head west You're almost done with this quest.

Pine cones eaten by chipmunks
Some of them with a lot of spunk
Cars driving on the road to your right
When you reach the "T" in the trail turn right.

Look for Sign 5 to the left of the trail on a pine tree

The trees change as you enter the pine forest
Here games and building fairy houses are the best
Walk through the wood and you are back
to the beginning
Now you're done and should be grinning.

Congratulations you've completed the quest! Stop inside the nature Center at the front desk for your stamp.
