




Full Moon. This full moon closest to the autumnal equinox was some version of Harvest Moon among all the Eastern Woodland tribes.



Dark-eyed Juncos and White-throated Sparrows arrive from the north.








The **Draconid meteor shower** peaks, though you should be able to see the activity in the evenings a few days before and after the peak.



The needles of **larch trees**, the only northern deciduous conifer, turn brilliant yellow before they drop.






Look for the beautiful pale-yellow fall color of colonies of hay-scented fern in upland forests. White-tailed Deer don't eat hay-scented fern, so large, thriving colonies can indicate a high population of deer.

Look closely at rotting logs to see the tiny fruiting bodies of wolf's milk slime mold, which are bright pink to purplish grey.


Slime molds are not fungi but singlecelled organisms that feed on fungi, bacteria, and other microorganisms.









The **Orionid meteor shower** peaks after midnight tonight.
