DISCOVERERS

Entering pre-K or Kindergarten (ages 4–5)

Discoverers must be age 4 by June 1.

Counselor-to-Camper Ratio: 1 to 5

Half Day: 9:00 am-12:30 pm Full Day: 9:00 am-2:30 pm

The Discoverers program is designed to encourage a young child's curiosity, increase sensory awareness, and introduce nature exploration. Sessions are half-day (with a midmorning snack brought from home) or full-day (with snack and lunch brought from home).

ADVENTURERS

Entering Grade 1 (ages 6–7)

Counselor-to-Camper Ratio: 1 to 5

Half Day: 9:00 am-12:30 pm Full Day: 9:00 am-2:30 pm

The Adventurers program provides continued field experience and to increase a child's comfortability in nature. Using exploration, crafts, and creative games, we focus on animals and their habitats. Sessions are half day (with a mid-morning snack brought from home) or full day (with snack and lunch brought from home).

DISCOVERERS & ADVENTURERS THEMES

Bug Bazaar

June 26-30

Insects are all around us and a crucial part of our food webs. Get comfortable with bugs of all kinds and learn why they are such good friends to us through games and crafts. From grasshoppers to crickets, bees and butterflies, no bug is too big or small to examine.

Earth and Sky

July 5-7*

*No camp on July 3-4; session prorated accordingly
Hunt for earthworms, watch clouds, and roam the field
and forest as we explore high, low, and everywhere in
between. Learn about the many wonders of nature on
our big, beautiful planet.

Mighty Mammals

July 10-14

An otter can swim, so why is it a mammal and not a fish? Discover the differences between mammals and other groups of animals like fish, birds or reptiles. Feel mammal fur, and search for the ones that make their home on Cape Cod!

Animal Instincts

July 17-21

Think like a rabbit, hiding and hopping through the field, and hear like a deer using special ears. Nature-themed games and activities will help us understand animal behavior. Discover how different animals see, smell, hunt, hide, and travel.

Dig It!

July 24-28

There is a world beneath your feet! Slippery salamanders, many-legged millipedes, spitting clams, and camouflaged crabs are some of the fascinating wildlife you might find on our daily explorations. Gently uncover these creatures as we play in the sand, dirt, and mud!

Rad Reptiles

July 31-August 4

What makes reptiles and amphibians unique from their furry counterparts? Find out by investigating shed snake skin and a turtle's shell, and discover where reptiles lay their eggs. Travel to nearby ponds or vernal pools to look for salamanders and catch tadpoles, frogs, and turtles. Get wet and muddy searching for our scaly friends!

Things with Wings

August 7-11

Hummingbirds hover, hawks soar, and dragonflies zip through the sky. Animals that fly are fun and exciting to observe. Use binoculars, nets, and bug houses to get a close look at the adaptations that allow these animals to fly so high.

Habitat Investigators

August 14-18


Study the homes of Cape Cod's wildest residents as we trek through the sanctuary's field, forests, and wetlands. Use your sense of smell, touch, and hearing to get a closer look at our often-overlooked creatures. Keep a nature journal of what we find and have plenty of time to explore the outdoors.

Music of Nature

August 21-25

What is that sound you hear? A bee buzzing, a bird singing, the wind rustling leaves? Use your ears to listen to all the sounds that nature makes, and understand why. We'll mimic calls, and make instruments out of natural materials to play.





EXPLORERS

Entering grades 2-3 (Ages 7-8)

Counselor-to-Camper Ratio: 1 to 8 9:00 am-2:45 pm

The Explorers program emphasizes the natural history of animals and the interrelationships of all living things through observation and hands-on field activities.

Sessions are full-day with time for snack and lunch.

NATURALISTS

Entering grades 4–5 (Ages 9–10)

Counselor-to-Camper Ratio: 1 to 8 9:00 am-2:45 pm

The Naturalists program allows those interested in science to participate in field activities while learning methods and techniques used in wildlife conservation biology. This program also includes one weekly field trip off-site relevant to the subject being studied, as well as fun nature-based games and crafts! Sessions are full-day with time for snack and lunch.

EXPLORERS & NATURALISTS THEMES

Survival Specialists

June 26-30

Investigate unique adaptations that help animals and plants survive in Wellfleet Bay's diverse habitats, including a salt marsh, pond, forest, and field. Learn about specialized survival skills through games, shelter building, and more.

Rock On!

July 5-7*

*No camp on July 3-4; session prorated accordingly

Dig deep into the history of land, soil, and rocks! Through scientific explorations and a fossil collection, you'll uncover the secrets of pebbles, boulders, and bedrock, learning where they came from, why they matter, and how they impact the ecosystem and wildlife found at Wellfleet Bay. Design your own creation inspired by the wonderful world of geology.

Day and Night

July 10-14

What happens at Wellfleet Bay when the sun goes down? Bats, owls, muskrats, and other creatures of the night reign while daytime animals (and campers) sleep. Learn how nocturnal animals use the dark of night to their advantage.

Bird Olympics

July 17-21

Have you ever wondered why different species of birds look so different from one another? They are the elites of the adaptation world! Determine which ones are master builders, long distance fliers, and top-level predators. Learn how to use binoculars and track different patterns and cycles of summer birds on Cape Cod.

Into the Woods

July 24-28

Life within the pine and oak forests nearby hide some wonderful wild friends! We'll examine the leaf litter of the forest floor for box turtles, roll logs for salamanders, and listen for woodpeckers. This week, we'll use special guides to identify kinds of trees, and do leaf rubbings to learn all about this habitat.

Carnivore Camp

July 31-August 4

Carnivores are animals with amazing predatory adaptations that allow them to capture and eat other animals. We'll search low for snakes and frogs and high for hawks and dragonflies to find out what these carnivores like to eat.

Ocean in Motion

August 7-11

Why does the tide roll in and out? And what causes all the commotion in the ocean? Discover what makes the waters around Cape Cod move, and which animals and plants can live between these changing tides.

Fascinating Food Webs

August 14-18

Organisms big and small are all connected by a web of life. Find out how our ecosystems and creatures interact and rely on one another. Use microscopes to identify some of the smallest critters and visit all the habitats that are crucial to one another.

From Streams to Sea

August 21-25*

*This week is only offered for the Explorers age group
Explore freshwater habitats for various aquatic life, from
stream to sea. Set eel traps while learning about their
lifecycle, and see unique changes that these running
freshwater bodies of water undergo as they empty into an
estuary. Collect water specimens to observe their behaviors
and adaptations.

ECOLOGISTS

Counselor-to-Camper Ratio: 1 to 10 9:00 am-2:45 pm

Ecologists go beyond basic natural history knowledge by working closely with Mass Audubon specialists and science staff to participate in inquiry-based activities, research, and ecological management studies. All sessions include opportunities to learn practical field techniques and practices for working with wildlife, as well as fun games and team-building activities to develop lasting friendships.

Entering Grades 6–8 (Ages 11–13)

Counselor-to-Camper Ratio: 1 to 10

Animal Artisans

June 26-July 30

Field Trip: Kayaking Nauset Marsh

The leaping, swimming, and soaring animals of the sanctuary will be your subjects for painting, drawing, sculpting, and more. Investigate how these animals themselves are artisans in nature as you take detailed observation of your subjects. Set out with your nature journal to help capture their likeness in clay and on canvas, and bring home a masterpiece.

Amazing Amphibians

July 5-7*

No camp on July 3-4; session prorated accordingly Field Trip: Long Pasture Wildlife Sanctuary

Amphibians have a unique and fascinating life cycle, with some amazing adaptations! The Cape is home to many species of salamanders, frogs and toads to see. We'll explore special vernal pool habitats where these species breed, catch fowlers toads in the grasses, watch bullfrog tadpoles swim, and learn why they are the true masters of evolution.

One Planet

July 10-14

Field Trip: Horseshoe Crab Tagging

From our oceans here on Cape Cod, to lush rainforests in the Amazon, all habitats on earth are interconnected. The relationships between humans and wildlife are needed for survival, yet wild spaces are rapidly declining. Why do humans and shorebirds both rely on Horseshoe Crabs? How do salt marshes protect us, as well as terrapin turtles? This week, delve into some of the deep connections within our local habitats, and how we can support them!

Nature Photography

July 17-21

Field Trip: White Cedar Swamp

Set your focus on photographing turtles, frogs, crabs, and other Cape Cod wildlife. Bring your phone or camera to get a lesson on how to compose and capture images and then photograph wildlife both on and off the sanctuary and work with professionals in the nature photography field. You'll have the opportunity to take plenty of pictures and identify and document as many plants and animals as possible during a "bio-blitz." Showcase your work for family at the end of the week.

Shark Enthusiasts

July 24-28

Field Trips: Chatham Seal Cruise/AWSC Center

Immerse yourself in shark biology and marine science through hands-on labs and field trips to several local destinations. Engineer hydraulic arms to complete sampling challenges, learn about the various tags used in tracking sharks, study the anatomy of a shark by completing a shark dissection, and take a boat to observe the white shark's primary food source—seals! Offered in partnership with the Atlantic White Shark Conservancy (AWSC).

Aquatic Adventures

July 31-August 4

Field Trip: Marine Life Cruise

Explore the outer beaches of Cape Cod and better understand the amazing impacts that the open ocean has on our habitats. Take a dive into some of the research that Mass Audubon is working on to help protect wildlife and human communities near barrier beaches. Survey coastal water-birds, pull fish pots, and go netting for microorganisms at high tide.

Endangered Species

August 7-11

Field Trip: Whale Watch

Cape Cod sees some of the world's most amazing creatures, but some have become a rarity to see in the wild! This week, we'll learn about Endangered Species to understand their biggest threats, and what we can do to help. From terrapin turtles to Piping Plovers to spotted salamanders, we'll part-take in some specialized projects helping strengthen these populations of animals.





COUNSELORS-IN-TRAINING

High Schoolers (Ages 14–17)

9:00 am-2:45 pm

If you are a teen who enjoys being outside in nature, working with children, and wants to learn leadership skills, then apply to our CIT program!

Participate in training sessions and assist counselors by creating activities and helping with camp activities. You will develop leadership and educator skills while honing your natural history knowledge. CITs must participate in at least 2 sessions in order to create meaningful bonds with their camper groups and counselors. REGISTRATION POLICY

Registration begins in January for Cape Cod Residents only(campers must provide proof of attendance to a Cape Cod school). All other registrations will open in February. Mailed registrations will be stamped with the date of receipt and processed on a first-come, first-served basis. Registration will be limited to no more than 4 sessions per camper.

REGISTRATION CONFIRMATION

A confirmation letter/email containing important documents and information will be sent once your camper's registration has been processed.

DEPOSIT

Registration must include payment for 50% of the total camp fees and includes a nonrefundable deposit of \$75 per camper, per session. This deposit is applied to your camp tuition and cannot be transferred to another camper, family, or camp location. If registering after May 15, payment in full is required, unless a payment plan has been established with the Camp Director.

REFUND POLICY

A full refund, minus the nonrefundable deposit, is provided to camp families who cancel in writing on or before May 15. After May 15, no refund is available. Deposits are not transferable, and refunds are not given for participant dismissal, failure to attend, absence, or sick days. If we must cancel a session, you will receive a full refund.

SLIDING SCALE PRICING

Mass Audubon is committed to ensuring that every family that wants their child to experience summer camp should have the opportunity to do so. A sliding scale model helps us work toward that goal through an easy and dependable process for families.

MEMBERSHIP & DISCOUNTS

Mass Audubon members at the Family level or above receive a discounted rate. To qualify, your membership must be current through your camper's last session, and you must be the parent, grandparent, or legal guardian of the camper being enrolled. Membership can be purchased or renewed at the time of registration. If you are unsure of your member status, please contact

IMPORTANT DEADLINES

All camp forms, waivers, and the balance of your camp tuition are due by May 15. If registering after May 15, payment in full is required and a specific camp form deadline will be set for you. A camper cannot attend camp and their spot is not guaranteed until all forms, waivers, and payments are completed (or a payment plan has been established).

CAMPER REQUIREMENTS

Campers are expected to be able to follow all safety protocols, including COVID-19 policies, to be determined by the start of camp based on the latest guidelines from the Massachusetts Department of Public Health. All campers must follow stated behavior expectations and safety rules. To ensure a successful camp experience, please discuss any pertinent information regarding your child's needs with the Camp Director. We strive to make camp a great experience for all, and we can accommodate on a caseby-case basis. The Camp Director reserves the right to dismiss a camper when, in their judgment, the camper's behavior interferes with the rights of others or violates the camp's safety and behavior policies. In such cases, no refunds will be provided. If you have any questions regarding your child's ability to participate in our camp program, please contact the Camp Director.

CAMP LICENSE

Our camp complies with the regulations of the Massachusetts Department of Public Health (105 CMR 430) and is licensed by the Wellfleet Board of Health.

ACA ACCREDITATION

We are proud to be accredited by the American Camp Association. Developed exclusively for the camp industry, this nationally recognized program focuses on program quality, health and safety, management, and camp operations.

CAMP POLICY REQUESTS

You may request copies of our background check, health care, discipline, bullying, and grievance policies at any time.

AGE/BUDDY REQUESTS

You may request that your camper be placed in a group with a friend of the same age. One buddy request per camper will be honored when possible. Both campers must be the same age and both must request each other. All buddy requests must be made in writing at least one week prior to the first day of camp. We are unable to accommodate buddy requests on the first day of camp.

SESSION TRANSFERS

Session transfer requests will be honored if there is space available and if a request is made at least two weeks prior to the session start date, after which transfers are not permitted.

FINANCIAL AID

We believe connection with the natural world should be available to all. If finances are getting in the way of a summer at any Mass Audubon Camp, financial assistance is available based on demonstrated financial need and available funds. Scholarships are limited to one session per child; however, all applications are considered and will be accepted on a rolling basis. Payment plan options are also available. Please visit massaudubon.org/campforms to download a financial aid application.



SLIDING SCALE PRICING

Each family will enroll for camp at a tuition rate based on their annual gross income. At registration, you will have the opportunity to select the pricing tier that best fits your family's gross income. If you select Tiers 1–3, you will be asked to upload income verification documentation at a later time. Campers who reside on Cape Cod year-round automatically qualify for Tier 3. Proof of the camper's enrollment in a Cape Cod school district in the form of a report card, progress report, or letter from the school must accompany registration. All other camper families will fall into Tiers 4 or 5, and do not need to provide proof of income. If cost is still a barrier under the tiered structure, financial aid is also available.
