Spend the Summer Working in the Field

Crews spend the summer getting a variety of hands-on fieldwork experiences, with opportunities for scientific research and supporting Mass Audubon's mission. Past summer work has focused on coastal wetland ecology, invasive species removal, climate resilience, and urban ecology. The program centers career exploration and supporting young professionals in building foundational expertise to propel them forward in a green career.

Submitting an Application

Our highest priority is finding the best candidate for the job. Research has shown that people of color and women are less likely to apply for jobs if they don't believe they meet every one of the qualifications described in a job description. We encourage you to apply, even if you don't believe you meet every one of our described qualifications or you have a less traditional background.

MCC crew members will spend the summer outdoors, getting their hands dirty in the name of science: Observe plants and wildlife, collect data, and carry out projects to support nature-based climate solutions.

Applicants should be between the ages of 18-22, interested in science, excited to do fieldwork, and willing to learn on the job. The position is 35 hours a week for 8 weeks, starting in June.
